# PRIVACY NOTICE RELATING TO PUPIL INFORMATION

#### What is the purpose of this Notice?

This is the Pupil Privacy Notice of Shropshire Church of England Academies Trust which is intended to provide you with information about how and why we process pupil information. It is also intended to provide you with other information which is required under the UK General Data Protection Regulation (the retained EU law version of the General Data Protection Regulation (EU) 2016/679) (GDPR) and the Data Protection Act 2018 (DPA). The GDPR and DPA contain the key laws relating to data protection.

It is important to us, and a legal requirement, that we are transparent about how we process pupil information. As a MAT that processes pupil information, we are known as a "data controller". This means that we collect and use personal information for specified purposes which this Privacy Notice has been designed to tell you about.

## The Data Protection Officer

## What categories of pupil information do we collect?

The types of pupil information that we collect include:

- Pupil names, unique pupil numbers, contact details including emergency contacts
- Characteristics such as ethnicity, language, religion
- Free school meal and pupil premium eligibility
- Medical information and administration such as doctors' information, child health, dental health, allergies, medication, and dietary requirements
- Admissions information
- Attendance information such as sessions attended, number of absences, absence reasons and previous school(s) attended
- Information relating to pupil exclusion and behaviour
- Attainment records and assessment results
- Reported accidents
- Safeguarding information such as court orders and professional involvement
- Special educational needs information including the need
- Photographs
- CCTV images captured in school
- Biometric data (finger prints)
- Details of any support received including care pakcages, plans and support providers.

We may also receive some information from our Local Authority, other schools and the DfE.

#### What is the purpose of us collecting and using pupil information?

The purposes for which the MAT collects personal information are as follows: -



- To provide effective education
- To provide appropriate pastoral care
- Census reporting
- To provide free school meals
- To support children with medical conditions, allergies, and SEN
- To manage admissions
- To monitor attendance
- To manage exclusions and behaviour
- For assessment and examination purposes
- For health and safety purposes
- To address safeguarding concerns
- To promote the school and celebrate educational achievement
- To ensure that the school is safe and secure
- To allow cashless payments to be made

#### Why is it lawful to collect this pupil information?

As a MAT, we are subject to a wide range of laws which we must comply with to further pupil education and to safeguard their wellbeing. To comply with these laws, we only process personal information as far as is necessary to meet those obligations. We also process some of the information described in this privacy notice to carry out public tasks vested in us to effectively manage the MAT.

In limited circumstances, we will obtain your consent; for example, if we want to place photographs of pupils on our website, in the newspaper or on social media. Even if you consent to us collecting and using personal information, you have a right to withdraw your consent at any time.

Some types of pupil information are regarded as more sensitive under the GDPR and referred to as being a 'special category' of personal information. This could include information which we collect for safeguarding or SEN purposes. Where we process this type of personal information, it will often be processed for reasons of substantial public interest such as safeguarding or to comply with statutory requirements.

#### Withdrawal of consent

Where we are processing your personal data with your consent, you have the right to withdraw your consent at any time. #### Who will we share pupil information with?

Those who we may share pupil information with include the following:-

- Our local authority
- The Department for Education (DfE)
- Other education providers
- School nurse service
- Multi-agency partners
- Professional advisors
- Careers service providers
- Service providers who provide learning platforms, IT and communication tools
- Service providers who provide school meal administration services
- Auditors to meet a legal obligation
- Schools that pupils attend after leaving us

- Lichfield and Hereford Diocese public task to meet our legal obligations to share certain information with it such as school admissions, safeguarding concerns and exclusions.
- Our regulator e.g. Ofsted / SIAMS to meet a legal obligation
- Police forces, courts and tribunals to meet a legal obligation

# The Department for Education

The Department for Education (DfE) collects personal data from educational settings and local authorities via various statutory data collections. We are required to share information with the Department for Education (DfE) either directly or via our local authority for the purpose of those data collections, under section 5 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

All data is transferred securely and held by DfE under a combination of software and hardware controls, which meet the current government security policy framework.

## Local Authorities

We may be required to share information about our pupils with the local authority to ensure that they can conduct their statutory duties under the Schools Admission Code, including conducting Fair Access Protocol.

## How long will we hold pupil information for?

We will hold pupil information for a period of time specified by law and as detailed within our retention policy. For more information, please contact the DPO.

## Requesting access to your personal data

The UK-GDPR gives parents and pupils certain rights about how their information is collected and used. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact the school administrator / data protection officer - HY Education, Sandbrook House, Sandbrook Way, Rochdale, OL11 1RY or by telephone on 0161 543 8884 or by email (DPO@wearehy.com).

You also have the following rights:

- the right to be informed about the collection and use of your personal data this is called 'right to be informed'.
- the right to ask us for copies of your personal information we have about you this is called 'right of access', this is also known as a subject access request (SAR), data subject access request or right of access request.
- the right to ask us to change any information you think is not accurate or complete this is called 'right to rectification'.

- the right to ask us to delete your personal information this is called 'right to erasure'
- the right to ask us to stop using your information this is called 'right to restriction of processing'.
- the 'right to object to processing' of your information, in certain circumstances
- rights in relation to automated decision making and profiling.
- the right to withdraw consent at any time (where relevant).
- the right to <u>complain to the Information Commissioner</u> if you feel we have not used your information in the right way.

There are legitimate reasons why we may refuse your information rights request, which depends on why we are processing it. For example, some rights will not apply:

- right to erasure does not apply when the lawful basis for processing is legal obligation or public task.
- right to portability does not apply when the lawful basis for processing is legal obligation, vital interests, public task or legitimate interests.
- right to object does not apply when the lawful basis for processing is contract, legal obligation or vital interests. And if the lawful basis is consent, you don't haven't the right to object, but you have the right to withdraw consent.

If you have a concern about the way we are collecting or using your personal data, you should raise your concern with us in the first instance or directly to the Information Commissioner's Office at raise a concern with ICO.

## How Government uses your data

The pupil data that we lawfully share with the DfE through data collections:

- underpins school funding, which is calculated based upon the numbers of children and their characteristics in each school.
- informs 'short term' education policy monitoring and school accountability and intervention (for example, school GCSE results or Pupil Progress measures).

• supports 'longer term' research and monitoring of educational policy (for example how certain subject choices go on to affect education or earnings beyond school)

# The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education (DfE) and contains information about pupils in schools in England. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

The data in the NPD is provided as part of the operation of the education system and is used for research and statistical purposes to improve, and promote, the education and well-being of children in England.

The evidence and data provide DfE, education providers, Parliament and the wider public with a clear picture of how the education and children's services sectors are working in order to better target, and evaluate, policy interventions to help ensure all children are kept safe from harm and receive the best possible education.

# Sharing by the Department for Education (DfE)

Under the terms of the UK GDPR, you are entitled to ask the Department for Education (DfE):

- if they are processing your personal data

- the reasons they're holding it and any recipient it may be disclosed to
- for a copy of your personal data and any details of its source
